MEMBER RETENTION AND ENGAGEMENT GROUP (MRE) REPORT

The Member Retention and Engagement Group (MRE) has successfully completed the work assigned by the Board of Directors. This ad-hoc group was formed with the purpose of understanding the challenges around member retention and engagement. The goal was to identify any issues contributing to membership resignations and explore ways to better engage members, particularly new ones. After all, an engaged member is a happy member—one who is less likely to leave the Club.

The MRE was made up of six dedicated member volunteers: David Ladd, Swarn Rajpal, Nick Pinciotti, Rick Paul, Kevin Doucet, and Bo Tamarelli (committee chair). Ray Buratto, Tom Dahlem, and Dennis Callan provided valuable executive and technical support throughout the project.

Positive Findings

The group's work uncovered some encouraging news: there is no significant evidence suggesting that members are leaving due to a lack of involvement. Generally, members leave the Club for reasons such as a move out of state, time constraints, or sadly, passing away. On average, around 50 members leave the Club each year.

Key Recommendations and Improvements

While there was no major crisis in terms of member retention, the MRE group identified several areas for improvement. They reviewed 19 ideas, categorized into six key areas of the member experience:

- New Interest Groups
- Communications
- Surveys and Census of Members
- Friday Meetings
- Community Engagement
- Process Improvements

Here are the key improvements and initiatives that have either been implemented or are in progress:

New Activity Groups: A formalized process has been created for starting new interest groups, such as bike riding or vacation-focused groups. For now, if interested, please contact a group member for a copy; we're figuring out the best place to house (all) the documents going forward.

Spring Member Survey: An annual survey (like the US Census) will be conducted to capture data on member participation and identify members who may need additional encouragement or support to re-engage with the club.

Friday Meetings: Several improvements have been made to enhance the Friday meeting experience:

A QR code allows attendees to easily download presentations and view them on their phones during the meeting.

A dedicated hardwired connection at the Iroquois Club significantly improves the remote experience for Zoom users.

The Greeter Program: has been reestablished. The Program's objectives are to welcome guests, visitors and special attendees at the Friday meeting, by meeting them as they arrive. The team guides and orients visitors to the venue and their spot for the meeting.

An enhanced attendance tracking system is now in place to help monitor participation and inform future event planning.

Member Communications: Several new communication initiatives have been introduced to improve member engagement:

A “Welcome to the XYZ Activity Group” letter, designed to give new members a clearer understanding of the group's logistics, format, and purpose.

A new member engagement process map, which provides activity leaders with a clear guide on how to engage new members.

A Key Contact Sheet, listing key contacts for each activity group, which is now available on the website for easy access.

A renewed emphasis on the role of sponsors in promoting ongoing engagement with new members.

A recommendation to review member/club software applications that could provide an all-in-one solution for member management, communications, event scheduling, and administrative tasks. The objective of the application software would potentially streamline manual processes, reduce paperwork and enhance member engagement.



SPECIAL EVENTS - FISHER BUILDING TOUR

The Fisher Building Tour, November 25, 2025



We filled a bus with 50 friends November 25th and headed for the Fisher Building in Detroit's New Center area. A representative of the Albert Kahn Foundation met us at the bronze doors to the building and led us to the lobby with its bronze elevator doors and vaulted ceiling.

"Look up," he said, and as we strained to focus, he pointed out symbolic figures and helped us decipher their meanings. "This was built to place Detroit among the great art and commerce centers of the world," Davy Webb told us.

General Motors paid the seven Fisher brothers \$27.6 million for a 60% stake in their company in 1919 and in 1926, GM purchased the remaining 40% for \$208 million. As a result, cost was not an issue when they began work on the building of what would become their namesake.

So they hired who they wanted and what they needed and finished the building in a little over one year. They basically told Albert Kahn to "Go wild."

Our tour took us from the lobby to the 28th floor, then to the 26th floor, back to the lobby then to the third floor where it's possible to touch the frescoes that fill the lobby's ceiling. Along the way we got to ask questions and see pictures of the early version of the building and the Fisher Theater.

Thank you to everyone who attended the December Investment Group meeting! Jason Geisz of Famiglia Wealth shared a historical market overview, discussed developments in AI, and offered his firm's outlook for 2026. Looking ahead to 2026, our January Investment Group meeting will be held on Thursday, January 15th. We're pleased to welcome back our longtime guest speaker Leon LaBrecque, CPA, CFP, CFA, JD, who will share insights drawn from his 50+ years of financial expertise.

Stock Game Update: As of this writing, Jack Burns leads the competition with a 25% gain from his position in Micron Technology (MU). Close behind, tied for second at 24%, are Rich McGee who holds Intellicheck (IDN) and QuickLogic (QUIK), and Anil Parikh, whose portfolio includes strong performers such as Edgewise Therapeutics (EWTX) and Treehouse Foods (THS). Nick Pinciotti follows with a 21% gain. Edgewise Therapeutics (EWTX) currently holds the highest individual stock return at 69% since the start of the game. 

The first is the deeply personal story of a son's efforts to find the men who conspired to murder his mother, a prominent crusader in Malta. The second describes Ronald Reagan's successful crusade to defeat communism.


We urge members to check the Club's website for the schedule of books to be discussed in 2026. The two groups will continue to meet via Zoom. As always, all members and their guests are welcome.



Wednesday January 7, 2026, at 10:30

AM: *A Death in Malta: An Assassination and a Family's Quest for Justice* by Paul Cauana Galizia: (New York: Riverhead Books, 2023) Pete Mehra will lead this discussion.

This book is a chronicle of the sort of silencing-by-murder that we might have thought happens only in Vladimir Putin's Russia. More than six years after the assassination of Daphne Caruana Galizia, an anti-corruption crusader who was the country's best-known journalist, the man accused of having conceived and paid for the car bombing that killed her is fighting the charges in court. He is one of Malta's richest businessmen and he politically well connected. Echoing a belief widely held in Malta, Mr. Caruana Galizia suggests that the businessman arranged the hit to prevent his victim from revealing - on her fearless blog which amounted to the Maltese "corruption encyclopedia" - details of a business deal in which he was involved. The book is also a son's distraught but beautiful tribute to his journalist-mother. The Guardian praised this book as "Unforgettable, beautifully written, and deeply honest."



Monday, January 19 at 3 PM:

The Crusader: Ronald Reagan and the Fall of Communism by Paul Kengor (New York: Harper Perennial, 2006) This discussion will be led by Jim is Allen.

Drawing upon reams of newly declassified presidential papers, as well as untapped Soviet media archives and new interviews with key players, Kengor traces Reagan's efforts to target the Soviet Union from his days as governor of California to the fall of the Berlin Wall and the collapse of what he famously dubbed the "Evil Empire." The result is a major revision and enhancement of what historians are only beginning to realize: That Reagan not only wished for the collapse of communism, but had a deep and specific understanding of what it would take—and effected dozens of policy shifts that brought the USSR to its heels within a decade of his presidency. Kangor makes use of key sources from behind the Iron Curtain, including one key memo that implicates a major American liberal politician in a scheme to enlist Soviet premier Yuri Andropov to help defeat Reagan's 1984 reelection bid.
