Special Event—Ford Piquette Plant



"You can get one in any color as long as it's black."

It is a famous line about Henry Ford's Model T, and as it turns out, it is not true.

On a tour of the Ford Piquette Plant on Sept. 16, a group of forty-eight from the Senior Men's Club saw lots of Model Ts in colors other than black, some with pin striping. There were also black ones and some with brass headlamps and radiators. Some restored and others that have not been touched in 75 years.



The museum has been given Model Ts that are rare and priceless — examples that prove that some of the old stories that are repeated over and over, simply are wrong. A docent provided examples as he led the group through the three-story brick building, built in late Victorian Style brick.

It was built in 1904, and it was sold to Studebaker in 1911 after Ford moved to the Highland Park plant in 1910. Astoundingly it has been saved and restored with original fire doors and water lines. Even a time clock.

The group from SMC spent an hour and a half touring the reconstructed plant and then had lunch in a banquet room that is also used for weddings and meetings.

Henry Ford's secret experimental room on the third floor gave the group an appreciation for the time and effort that went into creating the Model T. The room has been recreated with the help of people who have access to some of the original plans and machines, even the lights that were used in the plant 120 years ago.

The Piquette plant is in the Milwaukee Junction area of Detroit where the automotive colossus that became the Motor City developed. A few other cars from the era are on display to provide examples of the Ford Motor Company's competitors in the early 20th Century.

Member Spotlight



Dave Bakos-SMCB Life Member

Dave Bakos joined the SMCB in February 2013, sponsored by fellow GM'er Rick Ganfield.

Humble Beginnings: Dave was born in Cambridge, Ohio on December 19, 1935, the eighth child of Ralph and Susan Bakos. Both parents were from Austria-Hungary, which became Slovakia after WWI. His father came to the United States in 1894, his mother arrived in 1913, and they married in 1914 and settled in Ohio. His family had a small grocery store and a meat market for 66 years.

Early Years and Career: Graduating from Cambridge Schools Dave attended General Motors Institute (now Kettering University) and did co-op at Chevrolet in Parma, Ohio. Following his 1957 graduation as an Industrial Engineer his career began on the plant floor. He worked in manufacturing plants for 30 years—10 years each in Parma, Ohio; Warren, Michigan; and Livonia, Michigan, as General Superintendent of Production. In 1985, he was transferred to the Tech Center in Warren where he spent his last 15 years as Director of General Assembly for passenger vehicles. Retirement came on March 1, 2001.



Family Life: Dave has 3 children – a namesake son in Oxford, MI (who followed in dad's footsteps, attending GMI and spending his whole career at GM); a daughter, who lives in Atlanta GA; and another daughter in Salinas CA. He has two grandchildren. He and his second wife Judy live in Bloomfield Township.

Hobbies: Post-retirement Dave pursued his interest in glass blowing, as Cambridge, OH was known for glass manufacturing and Cambridge Glass (now closed). However, Cambridge Glass is still valued today among collectors. Though not a hot air guy, Dave blew glass at Michigan Hot Glass in Detroit as a hobby for over ten years, and has several beautiful pieces displayed in his home.

Life in SMCB: Dave became active in the SMCB Genealogy Group and chaired it for over 7 years, stepping down for health issues. He did not know much about his Slovak background and therefore became immersed in using genealogy in finding information about his family history.

Dave became a Life member in February 2023.

Why SMCB: Dave says the intermingling of men with diversified interests and a willingness to share their life stories and become friends supporting each other drive his interest in SMCB. The topics discussed at the meetings enriches all of us with both current and past affairs of our world. He also feels that being among good people with similar interests is good for our mental health. Dave is very impressed with all the great leaders that come forward and continue to enhance the SMCB.

Member Spotlight



Randy Barnett

Randy Barnett has been a member of the Senior Men's Club of Birmingham since 2016. His current SMC activities include golf, bowling, and the Investment Study Group. He takes pictures for the Club photo directory, is on the golf committee and the Board of the SMC Foundation. In past years he was chairman of the Attendance Committee and made the meeting name tags. A man truly committed to all things SMCB!

Early Years: Born in the Mississippi River town of Quincy, Illinois on April 13, 1947, his family moved to Mississippi when he was one, Virginia when he was four, and Michigan when he was fifteen. Randy graduated from Birmingham Seaholm High School (GO MAPLES!), and Michigan State University (GO GREEN!) with a BS in Building Construction Management. He was a construction manager for general contractors in Virginia, Maryland and Colorado on projects of single-family homes, apartments, commercial buildings, and home improvements.



Education and Career: Returning to school at age 33 to study Mechanical Engineering, notwithstanding an earlier undergraduate degree, the University of Colorado had him start at the beginning, so it took another four years. His first job as an engineer was at the Rocky Flats Nuclear Weapons Plant north of Denver. He was in the automation group, which allowed him to purchase and program some of the first electric robots made. He was hired by that robot company, American Robots in their Farmington Hills, Michigan office which got him back to Southeast Michigan but the company went bankrupt. He was then hired by KUKA Robots and after seven years moved to Fanuc Robots, and ended his career at SMC Pneumatics as a liaison to GM.

Family Influences: Randy's father Lowell was also a Mechanical Engineer, graduating from University of Illinois (GO ILLINI!). He worked for 49 years as a civilian employee of the Army working on vehicles like tanks, personnel carriers, mine layers, and the Humvee. He rose to become the Director of Engineering at the Tank Automotive Command in Warren, Michigan. Randy has one brother and one sister. The brother is a professor of environmental issues at the University of Louisville (GO CARDINALS!). His sister is a partner in a software company after a career in graphic arts. She worked for Apple and Adobe in the 1980's when they were "start ups".

Randy lost his wife Chris to cancer in 2019. Born in Scotland, Chris came with her family to Michigan when she was seven. Educated as a lawyer, her career included practicing law, doing social work, and 24 years as Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources at the Bloomfield Hills School District.

Why SMCB: Randy's father Lowell Barnett was a member of the Senior Men's Club. He loved it and Randy joined the very first week of retirement. Randy has traveled extensively since Chris passed but says he could never move away from the Senior Men's Club. He says the club has provided wonderful friendships and opportunities to have purpose.

Monday and Wednesday Reading Groups




The October books are likely to generate lots of interest. The first kicks off the Wednesday group's two-month examination of Putin's role in creating modern Russia, and the second tells the remarkable story of the effort to desegregate Detroit metropolitan area schools in the late 60's and early 70's.

Planning continues for our "hot books/hot topics" initiative. Stay tuned.

Wednesday, October 1 at 10:30 AM: Putin's Mafia State: A Story of Corruption, Control, and the Failure of Democracy in Russia edited by Leonid Nevzlin (Tel Aviv: Self- published, 2024) Roger Timm will lead this discussion

By the end of the 1980s, it seemed that totalitarianism was a thing of the past. Mikhail Gorbachev's Perestroika, or "restructuring," brought Russia closer to Western democracy than ever before. The economy was primed to boom. The citizens of Soviet Russia expected a liberated, free, transparent republic. What they got was a violent and imperial mafia state Why did the Restructuring fail? How did Russia reject democracy in favor of satisfying the interests of the people in power? What was Vladimir Putin's role in Russia's transfor-



mation into a gangster state? Co-authored by anonymous experts, and edited by a prominent Israeli philanthropist, Putin's Mafia State is a brave collaborative effort exposing the chilling turn of events that laid the foundation for Putin's ironclad hold on Russia's political system.

Monday, October 20 at 3 PM: The Containment: Detroit, The Supreme Court and the Battle for Social Justice in the North by Michelle Adams (New York: Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2025) This discussion will be led by Gordon Allardyce.

In 1974, the Supreme Court issued a momentous decision: In the case of Milliken v. Bradley, the justices brought a halt to school desegregation across the North, and to the civil rights movement's struggle for a truly equal education for all. How did this come about, and why?



In this book the University of Michigan's esteemed legal scholar Michelle Adams tells the epic story of the struggle to integrate Detroit schools—and what happened when it collided with Nixon-appointed justices committed to a judicial counterrevolution. Adams chronicles the devoted activists who tried to uplift Detroit's students amid the upheavals of riots, Black power, and white flight—and how their efforts led to federal judge Stephen Roth's landmark order to achieve racial balance by tearing down the walls separating the city and its suburbs.

From the Washington Post's review: "Adams chronicles the case with a compelling blend of academic rigor, reportorial legwork and engaging prose..."

Note: Professor Adams will discuss this book in person at the Southfield Library at 6 PM on October 16.

Cape Fear



On Monday, October 13th at 1:00 PM, Waller Harris will present, via Zoom, the outstanding horror/thriller film "Cape Fear" (1962) (1 hour / 46 minutes).

After serving an eight-year prison sentence, Max Cady (Robert Mitchum) targets Sam Bowen (Gregory Peck), one of the lawyers who helped in Cady's conviction. When Max finds Sam and his family, he begins a terrifying stalking spree, intending to ruin Sam's life. Not being able to obtain meaningful assistance from local law enforcement, Sam finds that, ultimately, he must take matters into his own hands to save his family from certain death at the hands of this violent psychopath.

Produced by Peck's company, Melville Productions, the film team includes several key cast and crew members who had previously worked with Alfred Hitchcock, including editor George Tomasini and composer Bernard Herrmann, so the film has both a frightening look and the appropriate eerie music to keep the audience in high suspense and dread throughout the movie. The excellent supporting cast includes Polly Bergen, as Sam's wife and Lori Martin as his 14-year-old daughter.

The film was released to positive reviews and enjoyed commercial success. It remains popular to this day as an outstanding crime/thriller having an 88% Rotten Tomatoes Score and an IMDb of 7.7/10 rating. Many film critics consider "Cape Fear" to be an outstanding masterpiece of revenge, confrontation and murder.

Grant - Alzheimer's Association of Michigan

The Board recently voted to award a grant of \$10,000 to Alzheimer's Association of Michigan . The grant will be used for ten scholarships. Each scholarship is to enable a 'caregiver' to participate in professional respite services, offering a muchneeded reprieve from daily responsibilities. More than 202,000 individuals in Michigan are diagnosed with Alzheimer's and approximately 385,000 caregivers provide around 872 million hours of unpaid care annually. This highlights the significant impact of the disease on families and communities across the state.

Below are two experiences because of our grant of last year recipients ...

- At 64, David is a full time 'care giver' for his wife Cathryn, 63 who is living with early onset Alzheimer's disease. David reduced his work schedule to three days a week to care for Cathryn. He takes his wife to an adult day center on his work days. The scholarship enabled David to take an extra day off once per month to be with Cathyrn. This allowed David to meet personal needs such as grocery shopping, cleaning his house, health appointments, exercise etc. David shared that the kindness and generosity of the scholarship gave him a chance to prioritize his own health and wellbeing. David stated that "He is incredibly thankful, and it is a gift he will not forget."
- Douglas is the primary 'care giver' for his 82-year-old mother Diane in addition to his own family responsibilities. David is with her each day, and hires help for nights and weekends. The respite care scholarship gave him increased time to be with his own family. The scholarship did more than provide care for Diane: it gave Douglas the chance to breathe, to be both a devoted son and a more present father, and for that he is deeply grateful.
