LIFE MEMBER INDUCTION - John C. Marsh, July 18, 2025

John Marsh was born in Tarrytown, N.Y. and lived there until he was 11 years old when the family moved to Michigan. His father was a partner and major stockholder in Demery's Department store on Woodward near the GM Building. It could compete with Hudson's because it had free parking. He lived in Bloomfield Hills and attended Cranbrook through ninth grade, then transferred to Wilbraham & Monson Academy near Boston. This was followed by the University of Michigan majoring in economics.

Upon graduation John joined the U.S. Army in 1961 and spent two years, including one in Saigon, South Vietnam working in intelligence. He was there when Diem, the first president of South Vietnam, was assassinated in 1963.

After his military service he returned to the University of Michigan Business School and obtained an MBA. He also met his wife Sheila at this time. They were married for 51 years. Sheila passed away in 2018. They had one son, Drew, who now lives in San Francisco. Drew is married with three daughters.

John spent 34 years with S.S. Kresge/Kmart, retiring as Assistant Treasurer. This was followed by 19 years as Vice President of Investments at Oppenheimer & Company.

John had several sports cars over the years. He drove one of them across the country and still participates in local car shows. He has been active in many clubs and groups like the Senior Men's Club, Optimists, Trout Unlimited, a Boy Scout leader, and a volunteer at St. Anne Meade, a nursing home in Southfield. He is also a member of Christ Church Cranbrook.

Special Event – A Day at the Big House

This trip was originally scheduled for January or February, but the Auto Show, theater bookings, and the annual migration of the “Snowbirds” conspired to push our special event into the sultry days of July. Undeterred by the summer heat and members vacationing “Up North,” we made our way to Ann Arbor—the proud home of the Big House.

And “big” hardly does it justice. With a staggering capacity of 107,601 seats, it's the largest stadium in America. (Though for sheer crowd size, the Brickyard in Indianapolis tops the charts with space for over 250,000 spectators.)

Our group of 57 - including our driver - arrived promptly at 10:48 a.m., greeted by a stellar guide team led by Don Svenson. Don was nothing short of brilliant, fielding every question with enthusiasm and encyclopedic knowledge of the Big House.

We began our tour in the press and TV commentary booths before making our way to the ultra-luxurious Executive Suites, which come with an eye-watering \$100,000+ annual price tag. Our next stop was the visiting team's locker room - a sparse, no-frills space typical of Big 10 accommodations, more penitentiary than pampering.

Then it was time to hit the field, where SMC members showcased their athletic flair - or lack thereof - with field goal attempts from the 50-yard line. The top performance? A modest 15-yard dribble by Jeff Miller. But the real highlight came next: a group photo right at midfield, immortalizing our moment in the heart of the Michigan Stadium.

Off to lunch (35 minutes late) at the Gandy Dancer where we enjoyed a superb 3 course lunch and a photo outside, The Gandy Dancer built as the Ann Arbor railway station in 1886 became a Chuck Muer in 1968 and is well worth a visit by car and not by train.

Edsel and Eleanor Ford Mansion

On May 28th, 48 SMCB members and guests were provided a tour of the Edsel and Eleanor Ford Mansion and Grounds in Grosse Pointe Shores on the shore of Lake St. Clair. The home, sitting on approximately 88 acres, was designed by famed architect Albert Kahn.

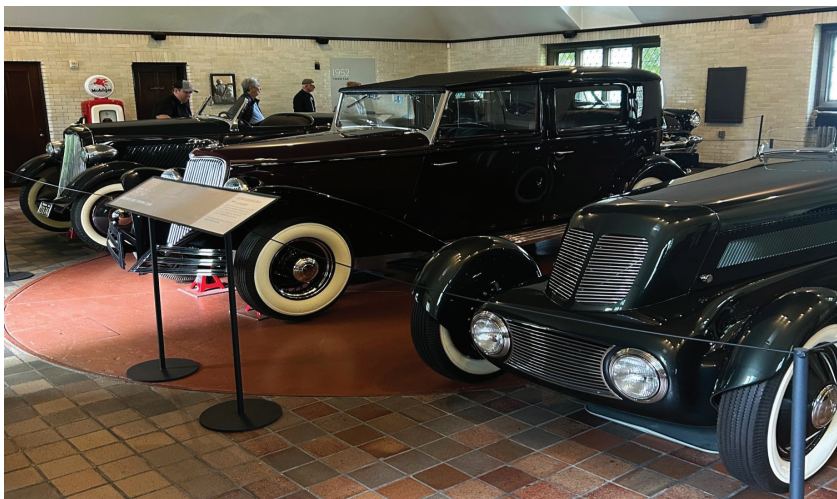
Guests were welcomed at the newly built visitor center where we enjoyed our boxed lunch prior to our tour. We were allowed to tour the property at our own pace, visiting the mansion, gardens, garage and “play house” during our time.

The mansion has been restored over the years since Mrs. Ford’s passing and is presented as it was when the Ford family lived there. The docents in the house were particularly helpful and pointed out some very interesting facts (the Grand staircase was imported from Europe and cut to fit the space in the entrance hall). There were some beautiful cars in the garage with more experts talking about their history as well. Of note was the Lincoln limousine that Mrs. Ford “toured around town” in!

This was the first event where the Special Events committee used a new ticketing method – Ticketstripe. The system worked very well and has become the way we will now “do business”. Special thanks to John Willis, Adam LaRose, Paul Kovceses and Jim Zyla for their work on the implementation and execution of this process.

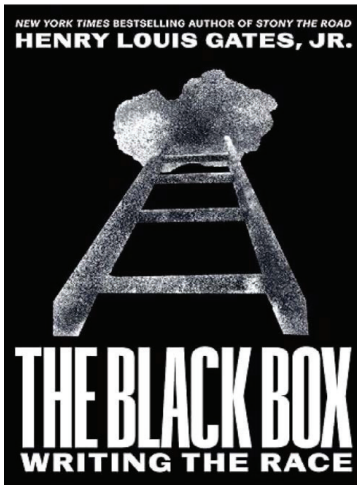

The August books, written from two very different perspectives, are sure to generate lively discussions on racism, diversity, identity, and opportunity. These are issues that are particularly relevant today.

The two groups will continue to meet via Zoom. As always, all members and their guests are welcome. Please let Bob Maxfield or Roger Timm know if you would like to be added to our distribution list.



Wednesday, August 6 at 10:30 AM: *The Black Box: Writing the Race* by Henry Louis Gates (New York: Penguin Press, 2024) Roger Timm will lead this discussion.

Henry Louis Gates, Jr., is a national treasure. Here, he returns with an intellectual and at times deeply personal meditation on the hard-fought evolution and the very meaning of African American identity, calling upon our country to transcend its manufactured divisions. Distilled over many years from Gates' legendary Harvard introductory course in African American studies, this book is the story of black self-definition in America through the prism of writers who have led the way from Phillis Wheatley and Frederick Douglass, WEB DuBois and Booker T. Washington, to Zora Neale Hurston and Richard Wright, James Baldwin and Tony Morrison. This is the epic story of how, through essays and speeches, novels, plays, and poems, a long line of creative thinkers has unveiled the contours of - and resisted confinement in - the black box inside which this nation within a nation has been assigned.

From the review in the Washington Post: "These reflections are elegant entrees into the debates that Black Americans have conducted in their long quest for self-definition. *The Black Box* succeeds not because it contains novel facts but because Gates's gloss on the established history glimmers."

Monday, August 18 at 3 PM: *The End of Race Politics: Arguments for a Colorblind America* by Coleman Hughes (New York: Thesis Books, 2024) George Stern will lead this discussion. The book was recommended by Doug Koschik.

As one of the few black students in his philosophy program at Columbia University years ago, Coleman Hughes wondered why his peers seemed more pessimistic about the state of American race relations than his own grandparents—who lived through segregation. *The End of Race Politics* is the culmination of his years-long search for an answer.

Through careful argument, Hughes dismantles harmful beliefs about race, proving that reverse racism will not atone for past wrongs and showing why race-based policies will lead only to the illusion of racial equity. By fixating on race, we lose sight of what it really means to be anti-racist. A racially just, colorblind society is possible. Hughes gives us the intellectual tools to make it happen.

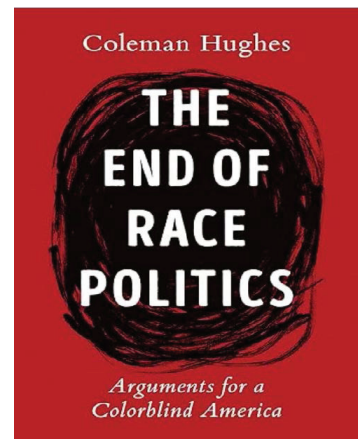
In praising the book Harvard Professor Steven Pinker wrote: "Humans have dignity and rights because of their ability to flourish and suffer, not their pigmentation. The affirmation of that moral principle here is humane, judicious, eloquent, and timely."

CLASSIC MOVIE GROUP

On Monday, August 11th at 1:00 PM, via Zoom, Fred Hansz will present the outstanding American musical / romance/comedy "The Singing Kid" (1936) (1 hour / 25 minutes). Directed by William Keighley, the film stars Al Jolson, as Al Jackson, an entertainer who has just moved into a magnificent New York City penthouse apartment and would seem to have it all; fame, fortune, and a large and loyal fan following. But his accountant, along with his current girlfriend, embezzles his fortune which brings on a nervous breakdown, as well as the loss of his singing voice. His doctor orders him to take a long vacation in the country and to forget all about show business, which, for Jackson, is almost impossible. But a meeting with pretty Ruth Haines (Beverly Roberts) and her adorable orphaned 9-year-old niece Sybil Haines (Sybil Jason) proves to be very therapeutic. Haines is an aspiring playwright, and Jackson decides to make his return to Broadway using her play. Although there are some misunderstandings and difficulties as the show opening date approaches, all is worked out by opening night and the play is a rousing success.

This was the last of eight films that Jolson made for Warner Brothers between 1927 and 1936. There are many excellent songs and dance routines throughout the film (many directed by an uncredited Busby Berkeley) and wonderful interplay between Al and Cab Calloway, as his neighbor in an adjacent penthouse and at the Cotton Club and on Broadway. These great musical numbers are what makes this film so enjoyable to watch. Also, Edward Everett Horton and Allen Jenkins are excellent supporting actors that play Al's loyal friends who stick with him as the going gets rough. The movie has a current IMDb score of 6.3/10.
